UX PROPOSAL FOR PEN AND INK FOR OFFICE GEMINI

Ink function should be intuitive and easily learnable through clear user cues, familiar design conventions and highlight the power and delight of the pen.

Mouse and finger is for selecting and manipulation. The pen must always reliably lay down ink strokes.

Depressing the barrel button on the pen while tapping or dragging will allow for ink or object selection.

If the pen has an eraser nub, the eraser should reliably erase area or stroke depending on application.

Since the pen must reliably lay down ink all the time, how do we insure this when some apps and their canvas don't accept ink content?

TRANSIENT

- Ink for annotations
- Ink for emphasis
- Ink for recognition (text, commands, shape)

PERMANENT

- Ink as object
- Ink as note taking
- Ink as content

TRANSIENT INK

is temporal, on a separate layer and can be repurposed

annotations

Appears on canvas as an annotation layer (acetate) that can be toggled off or on by the user or by application timing conventions.

Ink history can be saved and played back. Common ink controls, sticky notes and transport controls can be found in the transient command bar ribbon.

Annotated ink can be made permanent.

EXAMPLE

Power Point slide show, Word document, Reader, Internet Explorer

emphasis

Appears on surfaces that don't have an annotation layer. Used primarily for emphasis (e.g. pointing, underline, circling) when the ink doesn't need to be reviewable or permanent.

EXAMPLE

Any non-ink or reco enabled apps (Weather app, Pinterest, Pulse, Angry Birds)

recognition

Appears on surfaces that don't have an annotation layer where the ink can be automatically recognized as text or commands.

Can be toggled on in an annotation layer where ink is recognized as shapes, text or unique objects.

EXAMPLE

Windows Start menu, Outlook folder list, text fields, Visio canvas

PERMANENT INK

is part of the canvas, always visible

object

Appears on canvas that accepts ink as an object type. Sits within or on top of non ink objects in the canvas. Ink reflows with the content.

Users must explicitly add ink box or convert annotated ink.

Canvas must explicitly display ink controls in app chrome.

EXAMPLE

Outlook email body, Power Point edit slide content

note taking

Appears on canvas that accepts ink as content but in context of note taking.

User does not need to explicitly add ink box to add ink. Ink is automatically added to canvas along with text or other embedded content.

Ink controls can be custom to the app design; within canvas, on object or in app chrome.

EXAMPLE

One Note notebook, comments field

content

Ink is the primary content type. Other objects like text, images, video, etc. must be added through app UI.

Ink controls can be custom to the app design; within canvas, on object or in app chrome.

PPI brainstorm app, Fresh Paint

PEN HOVER

HOVER FEEDBACK

Provides immediate visual cue for pen behavior before ink or selection action

- Paired with hover guides (text reco, selection marquee)
- Dynamic – changes based on hover position or situation
- Predictable – always performs hover cue action

Art's Future Meets Its Past

Prada Foundation Remounts a 1969 Exhibition

VENICE — What's new in contemporary art? Old. We're in an age of remake culture, an epidemic of re-enactment fever. Young painters are working in styles that were hot half a century ago. Yesteryear's performance art is being re-performed. Exhibitions that have been done and done — on Matisse, Picasso, European abstraction — are being done again.

Has the art industry, noted for its nanosecond memory, suddenly become history-conscious? Is the art market, like Hollywood, nervous about anything but proven brands? Is art just plain out of ideas? Whatever the answer, the replicants keep arriving, a recent and particularly ambitious one being an ultrafastidious reconstruction of the 1969 show "When Attitudes Become Form," at the Prada Foundation in Venice.

The original version, which took place in Bern, Switzerland, has a near-mythical reputation as a late-20th-century landmark. It brought together some of the most adventurous young European and American avant-gardists of the day, exponents of post-Pop, post-Minimalist, supposedly anti-market trends like Conceptual and Process art. It presented them at a high moment of political and cultural turmoil internationally, and in what has been perceived as a radically loosened-up exhibition format, with art created communally, spontaneously, on the spot.

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The actual event was fairly low-key. Bern was no one's idea of an art capital. The exhibition site, a Kunsthalbe built in 1918, was drably undistinguished. The show opened in the gray month of March, ran for barely a month and drew only a small, bemused crowd.

Fuzzlement was understandable. The work, by almost 70 artists, jammed into two floors and a nearby annex, wasn't quite sculpture and certainly wasn't painting. Its mediums included ice, fire, broken glass, lead, leather, felt, fluorescent tubing, peas, charcoal and margarine. Hopes snaked through rooms; electric wires wound down a staircase. Nothing was framed or on pedestals or behind stanchions, and visitors trampled on work, though it was hard to tell where the art ended and the damage began.

Some damage was art. A piece by the American "earth artist" Michael Heizer consisted of craters punched with a wrecking ball into the pavement outside the museum. While popular reaction over all ranged from grousing to hilarity, officials took a more serious view. Certain Kunsthalbe staff members were so outraged that they effectively forced the resignation of the institution's director, Harald Szeemann, who was also the exhibition's curator.

Too late. Word had spread through the art world. The show — its full title was "Live in Your Head: When Attitudes Become Form: Works, Concepts, Processes, Situations, Information" — was instant history, a radical moment.

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

Art's Future Meets Its Past

Prada Foundation Remounts a 1969 Exhibition

VENICE — What's new in contemporary art? Old. We're in an age of remake culture, an epidemic of re-enactment fever. Young painters are working in styles that were hot half a century ago. Yesteryear's performance art is being re-performed. Exhibitions that have been done and done — on Matisse, Picasso, European abstraction — are being done again.

Has the art industry, noted for its nanosecond memory, suddenly become history-conscious? Is the art market, like Hollywood, nervous about anything but proven brands? Is art just plain out of ideas? Whatever the answer, the replicants keep arriving, a recent and particularly ambitious one being an ultrafastidious reconstruction of the 1969 show "When Attitudes Become Form," at the Prada Foundation in Venice.

The original version, which took place in Bern, Switzerland, has a near-mythical reputation as a late-20th-century landmark. It brought together some of the most adventurous young European and American avant-gardists of the day, exponents of post-Pop, post-Minimalist, supposedly anti-market trends like Conceptual and Process art. It presented them at a high moment of political and cultural turmoil internationally, and in what has been perceived as a radically loosened-up exhibition format, with art created communally, spontaneously, on the spot.
